Non-Members & non-financial members will be charged an extra \$10 on trips.



Public concern is growing after revelations about New Zealand First's role in delaying the installation of cameras on all commercial fishing boats. LegaSea today has issued the following media release.

Public contempt for Government inaction on fishing boat cameras

Six years after the Government first promised cameras onboard commercial fishing boats to prevent dumping and protect vulnerable species, there are fewer than 100 vessels outfitted with the technology.

A NewsHub investigation broadcast last night revealed an "explosive" recording in 2018 of Minister of Fisheries Stuart Nash blaming NZ First's Winston Peters and Shane Jones for the delay in fitting cameras on around 1000 boats.

A 2019 Horizon Research poll showed 69% of New Zealanders think not enough is being done to stop dumping of unwanted catch by commercial fishers.

"The Government cannot ignore the public's increasing frustration for those running interference and preventing Ministers from fulfilling their duties. The protection of bycatch species and monitoring dumping are core roles of Minister Nash and Fisheries New Zealand," says Sam Woolford from public awareness group LegaSea.

"The Minister must be free to make decisions in the interests of rebuilding depleted fisheries for the benefit of all New Zealanders. Electronic monitoring is one element that can be readily addressed," says Mr Woolford.

LegaSea and the New Zealand Sport Fishing Council recently released a plan named Rescue Fish that addresses the current regulatory capture where the industry and its regulatory body are too closely aligned and have the ability to sway political decision-making.

LegaSea spokesperson Sam Woolford says the Rescue Fish policy is an alternative to the Quota Management System (QMS) because the current situation is no longer acceptable.

"Over time fisheries management has become highly political. The QMS is clearly not functioning effectively. Our Rescue Fish policy is designed so there can be no outside influence of decision-making. All decisions will be based on strong principles and more effective legislation," says Mr Woolford.

"Given past donations and NZ First's ties to Talleys and other fishing companies it is important that we see a degree of separation from the decision-making processes."

The New Zealand Sport Fishing Council President Bob Gutsell commended NewsHub journalist Michael Morrah for breaking the news story wide open so the public can see what is going on behind closed doors.

"Clearly the QMS has had its day. It is not fit for purpose any longer and needs to be replaced. In good faith we have developed the Rescue Fish alternative so we can initiate the discussion on what a new fisheries management system might look like," says Mr Gutsell.

To address any cost issues, the Rescue Fish policy proposes the Government own and control the monitoring

equipment. Costs will be recovered through a new permitting system.

The groups say that any system that is able to be undermined in such a serious way needs reform and are calling on the Government to start a work programme as soon as possible to map out the reforms.

Public support for policy change is being sought through a <u>petition</u> and more information can be found on the <u>Rescue Fish website</u>.

Cameras on boats

Under the Rescue Fish policy cameras on commercial fishing boats would be mandatory. This would create transparency in an industry currently shrouded in secrecy. Check the Rescue Fish website for more details.

O. Who would pay for cameras under Rescue Fish?

A. Under Rescue Fish the Crown will own and control the cameras and electronic monitoring equipment aboard commercial fishing boats, except for the smart phones used for logging in/out fishing days and reporting catch.

The Crown will pay upfront costs for onboard cameras. Costs will be recovered over time from resource rental charges attached to fishing permits.

O. Who will own the video footage and data?

A. The Crown will own and be responsible for protecting the video footage and data. Electronic monitoring and cameras on all commercial vessels will help Fisheries officials monitor and validate catches, which is a problem with the current Quota Management System. Cameras will also help to protect vulnerable species such as seabirds and mammals.

Antarctica shock: 'Giant evolving' sea creatures unearthed by divers below ice revealed

ANTARCTICA divers made an incredible find below the ice, revealing "giant" sea creatures that had evolved thanks to the harsh conditions. By <u>Callum Hoare</u> PUBLISHED: 04:34, Thu, Apr 2, 2020

Antarctica: Deep sea divers discover incredible sea creatures

The <u>icy continent</u> serves as a scientific haven for more than 1,000 researchers around the year, who monitor climate change and study Earth's history. Its barren landscape gives them access to an unspoilt world, where they can complete their research without intrusion or political pressure. But, sometimes the scientists like to head beneath the ice to get a glimpse into an ecosystem untouched in millennia, and Advexon's "Under the Ice" documentary showed what happens when they do.

One of the divers said in 2014: "At this time of the year you can see almost a quarter of a mile ahead.

"These strange things are called brine channels, up on the surface the salt is concentrated in the frozen sea ice and makes brine that is so salty it stays liquid even when the surface ice cools it.

"When this cold brine flows downwards, it freezes the less salty seawater around it, making these tubes.

"We're diving in shallow water because most of the action is on the ocean floor.

"These sea stars have just finished off an urchin and are attacking each other."

But the cameras then revealed several larger species resting on the seabed.

The series added: "Some of these animals are much bigger than similar species elsewhere.

"This sea spider is a giant compared to its cousins that live in warmer waters.

"Isolation helps these animals evolve differently and their slow metabolism in the cold lets them grow older and bigger.

"Clearwater is great for us, but hard on life here.

"There's been no sunlight for four months, so nothing has been growing in the water."

The documentary went on to show the harsh realities of life below the surface, and how they must fight to survive.

It continued: "Everything is hungry – this anemone may look pretty – but it's a ravenous predator.

"The current has carried this jelly too close to the bottom and the anemone snagged it, sometimes they can eat an entire jelly.

"After about 40 minutes, you start to really get cold, it's time to get back to the warm hut.

"Under the ice, you have no clue what the weather has been doing, but this is Antarctica, it's sure to be different.

"When you come out you get orientated by looking for Mount Erebus, there it is smoking away in the distance." However, the team did have a warning over Antarctica.


Antarctica: Scientists attach camera to seal to study its activity

They noted: "On a slope below Mount Erebus, a glacier flows to the sea from the thick ice in the interior.

"In some ages of the Earth's history, Antarctica's ice has flowed completely away.

"Today, scientists are studying this ice, trying to learn whether it is growing or shrinking and why.

"This simple and precarious balance between what is frozen and what is not affecting everyone on Earth."
